The term "disc jockey" was initially used to describe radio DJs introducing and playing records for listeners. DJing, or disc jockeying is the art of playing and mixing music using a DJ controller or mixer and a set of turntables or CD players.

One of the pioneers of modern DJing was Kool Herc, a Jamaican-American DJ credited with helping to create the foundations of hiphop music. He is known for developing the technique of "breaking" or "scratching" records, which involves manipulating the record on a turntable to create new sounds and rhythms.

As DJing became more popular in the 1980s and 1990s, the technology used by DJs evolved. DJ controllers and digital DJ software became widely available, making it easier for DJs to mix and edit music using a computer.
